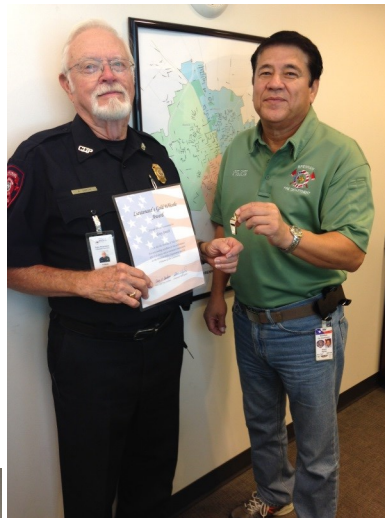

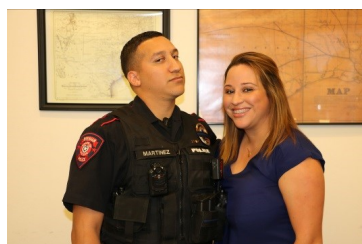

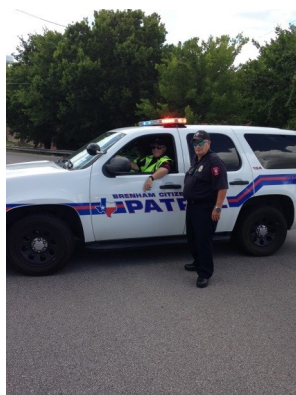

## Volunteer Spotlight

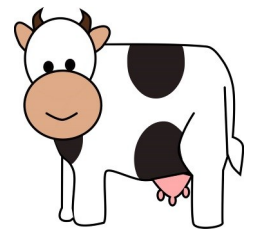
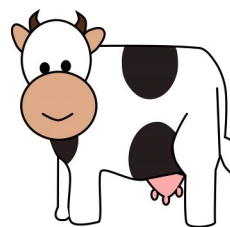
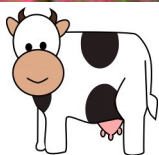

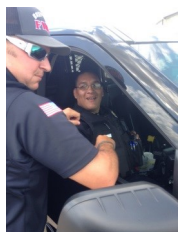

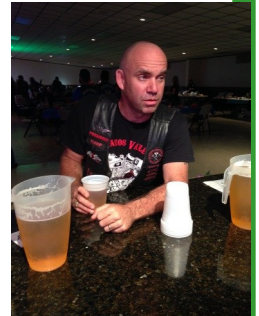

**FYI:** There is a new app out there that will help with crime fighting. This new tool was just launched by the FBI, it’s called the **FBI Wanted App**. It can be downloaded to your mobile devices; the app is free and works on Apple and Android devices, including smartphones, iPads, and iPods. Depending on your device, it can be downloaded from the Apple App Store or Google Play. It is designed to let the public help with the apprehension of criminals as well as locating lost or kidnapped victims. For example if you see someone in a news article or on the television newscast that looks like someone you have seen recently, you would open the app then by entering your city name into the app it will bring up individual profiles and pictures. If you think it’s the same person you simply click on the Call FBI button in the app. **FYI**

Police Chief Craig Goodman plans to bring "ALERRT" to Brenham. In an article in the Banner-Press on Sunday July 30th by Staff Writer Jay Strasner the following information was gleaned. How to react when faced with an active shooter at a school or place of business was the subject of the Rotary Club presentation held during the regular weekly meeting. Chief Goodman is an authority on the topic, having recently completed an intensive course on workplace safety, held on the Campus of Texas State University. The acronym ALERRT stands for Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training. From 2001-2014 there were 179 mass shootings in the U.S. and at 45% of those events, the shooter had no affiliation with the victims. Goodman said that in the past, students and employees took the approach of hiding from an attacker, much like they would during a tornado or other dangerous event. According to data, It take Police an average of 3 minutes to reach the scene of a mass shooting. The first mistake made is to deny that there is any danger at hand. Victims should assume the worst and quickly think about escape and

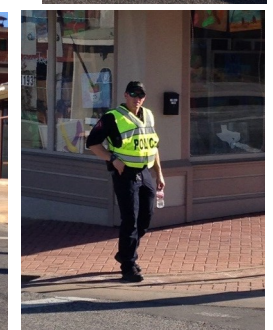
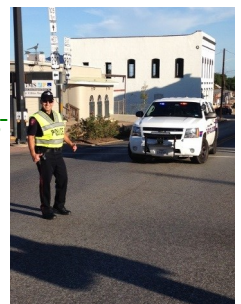


exits. Don't play dead; you're not helpless. The last step is to defend yourself. A lot of times there is only one shooter and there is strength in numbers. Goodman said that the BPD staff is eager to come to your school or place of business and help instruct you and your employees on the best practices of dealing with active shooters. They can do anything from an hour program to a four hour program. This is a lot like the Run, Hide, Fight program we saw a few years ago, but there is more good information that was used to tweak the program and help make everyone safer. I can't wait to view one of these programs; I think it will be quite helpful; I heard COPs are on the list to receive the "ALERRT" training. Thanks Todd!

# The Summit

On July 20<sup>th</sup>(2016), at 5 pm, the training room at BPD was the stage for the all-important Summit. The law enforcement community all around our nation was still reeling from the recent mass shootings; that seemed to be occurring with more frequency. That was followed by unfortunate police shooting incidents involving unarmed suspects. Then we had the shootings in Dallas where police officers were the targets. Still horrified by the Dallas tragedy; we were hit by more violence against police officers in Baton Rouge.

All the while your BPD Command Staff was strategizing and disseminating information to its officers. They decided to have a structured meeting with as many officers that could attend. Hearing about the meeting, the Mayor and City Manager asked to attend. The Police Chief started out with some reassuring remarks; and told of all the support he had seen from our community. He then advised all of the officers to be hyper-vigilant; with situational awareness being the key to their safety. The Captains then voiced their experience based opinions on how to handle certain situations. The Sergeants and Corporals in the room also had some wisdom to impart. This was like a round table discussion with audience participation encouraged. And even some patrol officers offered good ideas to keep everyone safe. Unfortunately, I did not take notes; and I don't know which ideas are now actual police department policies and procedures. But I can say that a lot of good came from that session.

After hearing from all of the officers that wanted to speak, the Mayor and City Manager took the floor to add some words of encouragement. They both said that it appeared that BPD seems to be prepared for any and all situations. And further, that the city fathers and citizens of our great community support their efforts. We all then gathered at the front steps of the Police Department building to pose for a picture of the Summit participants.

We weren't through yet, there was still the meeting of the COP Command Staff. Chief Goodman and Chris Jackson met with six members of your COP Command Staff to see if there was anything that we would like to change in order to be safer. The Chief was willing to change our uniforms; perhaps a different color, or polo shirts without patches. He also said that we could change the graphics on our patrol vehicles or the light configuration or even stop patrolling. We spoke about training, with situational awareness training being a must; and other training topics including mass casualty, first aid, active shooter and self-defense as options. We did conclude that any training would have to be held in a daytime session and a night time session on possibly different days in order to reach all of our members. All officers in the meeting were allowed to voice their opinions and ideas especially when we spoke about changing our procedures. The conclusions drawn after our discussions are as follows: The uniforms will remain the same; however, if anyone is uncomfortable or does not feel safe wearing it, they don't have to. The cars will also remain the same;

changing them would just defeat the purpose of having them. Anyone that does not feel safe patrolling alone should only go out with someone else on board. Two man patrol units is always a good policy. At large functions (like Hot Nights Cool Tunes) we would like to see at least two COPs stay together and at least one of them should have a handheld radio. We all agreed that we need more training; especially situational awareness training. We should also have mock accident traffic control scenarios. And as stated before, we should conduct this training in both a day and evening session; so that more members can attend. The other important thing that came from these meetings is that you must remain vigilant and don't think that this cannot happen here; it can happen anywhere!

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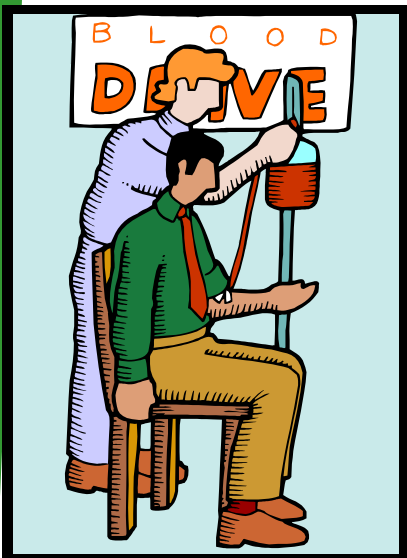
